We are beyond excited to announce our new **Japanese Studies major** beginning in the fall 2022 semester. The American University Board of Trustees approved the new major on Friday, May 13<sup>th</sup>. The course requirements for our new major are as follows:

## Course Requirements

### Required (12 credit hours)

- JAPN-314 Advanced Japanese I (3)
- JAPN-315 Advanced Japanese II (3)
- JAPN-414 Japanese Translation (3)
- JAPN-415 Japanese Civilization (3)

### **Linguistics (3 credit hours)**

Complete 3 credit hours from the following, or other coursework approved by program director:

• JAPN-311 Japanese Linguistics (3)

### Capstone (3 credit hours)

• JAPN-488 Capstone Project (3) (topics)

### **Electives (18 credit hours)**

Complete 18 credit hours from the following, or other coursework approved by program director:

- JAPN-210 Minorities in Japan
- JAPN-310 Advanced Topics in Japanese (3) [Japanese Media and Cinema, Japanese for Professional Purposes, etc.]

- JAPN-396 Selected Topics: Non-Recurring (1-6) (approved topic)
- JAPN-410 Advanced Japanese Topics II (3) [Japanese Literature, Post-WWII Japan, etc.]
- JAPN-496 Selected Topics: Non-Recurring (1-6) (approved topic)

### **NEW AU JAPANESE COURSES STARTING FALL 2022**

We welcome new courses beginning in fall 2022, including JAPN-414 Japanese Translation and JAPN-415 Japanese Civilization. Both of these courses will be taught using new Japanese language textbooks, the Japanese Civilization course taught completely through the medium of manga.

翻訳学 JAPN-414 Introduction to Japanese Translation (taught each fall semester)

Introduction to Japanese Translation (3) This course introduces the methods, techniques, and difficulties involved in translating between Japanese and English. It emphasizes translating general material, with some consideration of the translation of specialized material. It also introduces the field of translation as a profession.

日本文明 JAPN-415 Japanese Civilization (taught each spring semester)

This course introduces the history and culture of Japan as seen from a Japanese perspective. It focuses on the most salient historical events and cultural movements that occurred between the pre-Nara period to the present.

# <u>Underdogs and Antiheroes: Japanese Prints from the Moskowitz</u> <u>Collection</u>

March 19, 2022-January 29, 2023



Expect the unexpected. The exhibition *Underdogs and Antiheroes: Japanese Prints from the Moskowitz Collection* focuses on the captivating stories and urban legends of individuals living on the fringes of society in early modern Japan. Key subjects in theater, literature, and visual arts reveal antiheroes and underdogs whose virtues are often embodied by their rejection of societal norms, making them misfits and moral

exemplars at the same time. The exhibition will follow virtuous bandits, tattooed firemen who love to fight, rogues from the kabuki theater, and others. Highlighting the transformative gift of the Pearl and Seymour Moskowitz Collection to the National Museum of Asian Art, *Underdogs and Antiheroes* features subjects that are not commonly associated with traditional Japanese print culture but were nevertheless central to the interests of an early modern public. The exhibition will explore new visual and thematic ground, further strengthening the museum's trailblazing role in reconsidering presentations of Asian cultures.

#### INTERNSHIP AT KIZUNA ACROSS CULTURES



Kizuna Across Cultures is now accepting applications for our Aug 2022 - March 2023 internship to assist with our virtual language and culture exchange Global Classmates. University students who are passionate about international youth exchange, US-Japan relations, and Japanese language are a great fit for this unique internship. Interns work with KAC for 2 semesters (mid-August through early March), 10 hours per week remotely and 2 hours per week in virtual meetings. It is

possible for interns to be located outside of DC and still fully participate in the internship.

Interns act as Senpai (similar to a mentor) and engage directly online with the high school students from the US and Japan participating in our virtual language and culture exchange program Global Classmates, so bilingual English/Japanese is necessary. Students taking university 3rd or 4th year Japanese language courses have a sufficient language level to participate in the internship. We accept applications on a rolling basis and will accept them until all openings are filled.
