

# The Making of an Illiberal Democracy: The Case of Hungary




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### Hypothesis

- a) Economic decline created the conditions for dramatic political change in Hungary.
- b) Declining support for liberal values, rising nationalism, and the example of successful authoritarian regimes determined the illiberal nature of that change.

## 2010 Hungarian Election Results



- Orange=Fidezs/KDNP
- Red=Hungarian Socialist
   Party

### Findings

- Economic decline did in fact open the door to radical political change.
- There was no significant decline in the support for liberal values.
- Nationalist sentiment was rising in Hungary throughout the 2000s.
- There is no evidence of popular level admiration for authoritarian states though there is evidence of this phenomena on an elite level.

#### Sources & Methods

- Method→ A process-tracing study of the case of Hungary, with a focus on the leadup to the 2010 elections.
- Sources > Economic indicators, survey data, speeches by Hungarian politicians, news articles, materials from the House of Terror Museum in Budapest, election results and reports from democracy monitoring watchdogs.
